



Grape-leaf Anemone (*Anemone tomentosa*)

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Grape-leaf Anemone is an herbaceous perennial in the buttercup family. It produces masses of rosy-pink flowers on stems that seem to float above the plant. The foliage is dark green and the leaves resemble grape leaves. This anemone is best planted in groupings and makes an excellent cut flower.

Type	Perennial
Hardiness Zone	3 - 8
Sun	Full sun to part shade
Bloom Time	August - September
Height	3 - 4 feet
Spread	2 - 3 feet
Tolerance	Drought tolerant
Attracts	Butterflies and other pollinators
Additional Features	Deer and rabbit resistant

Soil and Site Recommendations

- Drainage: moist, well-drained soil
- Soil pH: acidic, alkaline or neutral soils
- Type: will grow in most soils, although limy soil is preferred
- Placement considerations: best planted in groupings

Planting Recommendations

- Type: plants or rhizome cuttings in late fall or division in spring
- When to plant: spring
- Mulching: benefits from mulching
- Spacing: 15-18 inches
- Spread: spreads rapidly by rhizomes
- Division/transplant tips: divide every 2-3 years in early spring

Maintenance

- Watering: average moist conditions
- Fertilization: little or none



- Pinching/deadheading: cut back to base of flower stem to encourage more blooms
- Annual maintenance: cut back in late fall

Common Problems

Disease: no serious problems

Insects: no serious problems

Skin contact may cause slight irritation
